# Workforce of the future: 1 million workers needed in Health & Community care by 2050

# Human Services Skills Organisation (HSSO) announced as sponsor of National Skills Week 2021

**16 August 2021** – The Human Services Skills Organisation (HSSO) estimates Australia needs 1 million health and community care workers by 2050<sup>(i)</sup> and highlights that human services is Australia's fastest growing sector, requiring a vast amount of specialist skills training and education.

Never in Australia's history has the need for skilled healthcare, aged care, disability support and human service carers been greater given the Covid-19 pandemic but also Australia's ageing population.

Partnering for the first time this year with National Skills Week, **HSSO Chief Executive Officer Jodi Schmidt** said the development of a skilled and available workforce is essential, as is the need to support a sector that provides career opportunities that can last a lifetime.

As Australia's largest employment industry, Health Care and Social Assistance employed around 1.7 million people last year (2020) and is expected to increase to more than 1.9 million by 2024 (AISC, 2020<sup>(ii)</sup>).

Qualification enrolments for human services increased from almost 333,000 in 2018 to over 357,000 in 2019 and included over 100,000 students completing courses (AISC, 2020<sup>(iii)</sup>).

"The HSSO is trialling new ways to shape the national training system in sectors such as aged care, disability and early childhood education services and is working with industry to develop innovative ways to address gaps in the workforce. We are representing industry to shape the skills and training needed to better support the sector, now and into the future," Ms Schmidt said.

"Skilled, confident, empathic and patient staff are seen as critical to how human services providers can successfully deliver services to improve the lives of people in our communities." she said.

"Every day, higher numbers of people accessing human services supports in their community including older Australians, people with a disability, children and families, and veterans."

Qualifications available to support human service careers include Certificate I to Certificate IV, Diplomas, and Vocational Graduate Qualifications in both Community Services and Disability, and can cover:

- · Aged care
- Nursing
- · Home and community care
- Disability
- · Employment services
- · Career development
- Counselling
- · Information, advice and referral
- · Case management
- Advocacy
- · Community service work.

Now moving into its eleventh year, **National Skills Week 2021** will be held August 23 to 29, inviting Australians to explore the many vocational career pathways required to support Australia's economic recovery from the pandemic.

**National Skills Week Chair, Brian Wexham, says** that during the week, areas of emerging skills needs are highlighted, career options profiled and inspiring stories told. There has never been a more pivotal time to educate job seekers and school leavers on the importance of gaining a skill and particularly highlighting key job growth industries.

"As Australia's largest employment sector, it's very significant that the Human Services Skills Organisation is on board for the first time as a key supporter of National Skills Week. Importantly, this organisation is helping ensure Australia meets its skills and employment needs of the future, whilst supporting an industry that creates greater social and economic inclusion within our communities" Mr Wexham said.

"The human services sector is one of the most diverse in Australia. It's a sector that delivers a range of different services to support people in a variety of ways, including practical everyday living supports, addressing personal crisis or achieving life goals," he said.

The National Skills Commission projects that the Health Care and Social Assistance industry will make the largest contribution to employment growth over the period 2020 to 2025. Increasing by 249,500 jobs or 14.2 per cent, which is almost double the projected growth in jobs of any other industry in the Australian economy (iv).

This growth is supported by the continued demand generated by the National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS) and Australia's ageing population. Large investments in hospitals and increasing demand for childcare and home-based care services also contribute to this strong projected growth.

#### Workforce of the future: the numbers

Australia needs to rapidly grow a diverse, skilled, values-driven and adaptable workforce to meet this demand:

- As of June 2021, there are approximately 3,750 unfilled vacancies with an additional 83,000 NDIS workers expected to be required by 2024, bringing the total NDIS workforce to over 350,000 (v)
- Within two years the aged care workforce will need to increase by around 3,600 Registered Nurses and 34,200 personal care workers. By 2050, the workforce is expected to grow to more than one million people (vi)
- The **children's education and care sector** requires an additional 30,000 educators (20% increase) and 7,000 teachers (16% increase) (vii)

The HSSO Chief Executive Officer Jodi Schmidt said their vision for Australia's human services sector to be equipped with a diverse, skilled and adaptable workforce, will ensure the strength of sectors like disability and aged care both now and into the future.

"National Skills Week is a great way to learn about getting the skills needed to enter or grow your career opportunities in human services and be a part of making a difference in people's lives," she said.

National Skills Week 2021 will be launched by The Hon. Minister Stuart Robert, Minister for Employment, Workforce, Skills, Small and Family Business of Australia during the week from 23-29 August via virtual link.
